




Museums and galleries:

- Laing Art Gallery




Cinemas, theatres and music

- Tyneside Cinema (independent old-school cinema)
- Theatre Royal (bigger touring productions)
- Independent theatres (Northern Stage and Alphabetti)
- The Glasshouse Gateshead
- Smaller music/cinema venues (Star and Shadow, Cobalt, the Cluny, etc.)



Outdoor spaces

- Jesmond Dene (waterfall and Pets' Corner)
- Ouseburn Farm
- Gosforth Nature Reserve
- City parks (Leazes Park, Town Moor, Nuns Moor Park, Heaton Park, etc.)



Shopping centers and food outlets

- Eldon Square: high street shops and restaurants (e.g. Nando's, Ask Italian)
- Northumberland Street (main shopping high street)
- Metrocentre (second largest shopping center in UK, accessible by train and bus)
- Grainger Market is full of independent food and shopping stalls




Public Transport

- One of the main methods of travelling around Newcastle is the Tyne and Wear Metro
- The metro map is divided into zones A, B, C, D. Zone A covers the city centre, with Haymarket Station opposite our main campus
- Zones B and C are further away, including locations such as the coast, Newcastle Airport and Sunderland
- Zone D is in Northumberland



Public Transport

- The three main bus operators are Stagecoach, Go North East and Arriva
 - Each service has its own tickets. **You can't use most tickets between different providers!**
- Great way to explore areas the metro doesn't reach
- When using the bus, you can pay by cash, card, or through using a Pop Pay As You Go card
 - You can get a Day Rover ticket that works on all the buses and the Metro
- All buses in Newcastle have 'age 21 and under tickets',

Tynemouth and Whitley Bay



These locations on the coast are only 20 minutes away by Metro. Great fish and chips!

Jesmond



Jesmond is well-known for the Dene, the Jesmond Food Market and Osborne Road.

The food market takes place the 1st and 3rd Saturday of each month on Armstrong Bridge.

Ouseburn



Ouseburn is home to venues like The Cluny, which is great for seeing live music.

You can also find artists' studios, an urban farm, a story-book museum, and an annual rubber duck race!
